Investment Objective

The investment objective of the Neptune US Income Fund is to generate rising levels of income with the potential of capital growth. It invests predominantly in a portfolio of North American securities, which may include Canada and / or the USA, or overseas companies that derive a significant proportion of their profits or turnover from the USA and/or Canada, with a view to attaining consistent top quartile performance within the appropriate peer group. Other eligible asset classes may include collective investment schemes, other transferable securities, cash or near cash, deposits and money market instruments. It is anticipated that derivatives instruments and forward transactions may be used by the ACD for efficient portfolio management.

UPDATE....

Much of the discussion with the fund manager was around the macro picture, but before we look at that it is worth considering the performance. Although the fund has outperformed over 1, 3 and 5 years and since launch, if you focus on the yearly figures the fund closely tracks the index and since the new manager has come on board it has underperformed the index. This is a challenge with US funds where very few consistently outperform the index; where they do sometimes it is very narrow, which begs the question as to whether it is worth the extra cost.

With this in mind, does it make this a fund to consider or not? George Boyd-Bowman would argue that now is the perfect time to invest in this fund. There are a number of factors which are making US dividends an attractive part of investing, and dividends make up an integral part of the overall returns. The two key factors are that there is regulatory backing to pay higher dividends especially with banks, and secondly tax changes will see money coming back into the US which will provide a spike in dividend payments.

The fund is positioned to benefit from this through a change in strategy to focus on dividend growers, which has brought down the yield in the short term, but longer term will benefit the fund. It also has a focus on technology but not necessarily in the way we would assume. Different industries benefit from technology; whether it's financials or digital media but also physical industries, which are introducing technology to improve productivity.

The second area of focus is businesses benefiting from millennials; individuals who still live at home but are increasing consumption which will benefit a raft of different companies.

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Although I understand the strategy, the performance is also important and taking the year by year performance it doesn't do any more than track the index. There is only one year where it outperforms. The manager is new and under his tenure it has underperformed. The 'unknown' is that he has implemented a new strategy and believes the fund is positioned for changes to the US economy. If he is correct, then the fund could perform strongly but are there other funds in a similar position? When considering this it is worth noting this fund has a high number of holdings (57) and really no conviction in its top ten.
