UPDATE....

Hermes have an excellent reputation for managing money in Asia and Emerging Markets. Although the performance over 3 years is average, over the longer-term investors can see the benefits of this strategy. We have to highlight that nearly £6 billion is invested in this strategy and larger funds can struggle to outperform. Potential investors would need to consider this when looking at the fund.

In terms of 2018, the highlights included technology, industrials and financials. Consumer discretionary was negative for the fund and exposure to auto components. Taiwan was negative due to exposure to supply chain for Chinese technology. Being underweight, Energy and in particular Russia and Qatar were negative.

China, Indonesia, Mexico, Peru and UAE were positive for the fund, and small/mid cap helped. Currency, especially Chinese currency, dragged down the performance.

In terms of where we are now, emerging markets are showing better earnings growth, multiples are cheaper and below long-term discount to developed markets (21% discount vs 18% historical discount).

Main regions are China (35%), India (14%), Taiwan (11%), Korea (10%) and Brazil (8%). They have reduced down exposure to China. They still like India and think it is attractive but have concerns going into the elections. In China they are adding to positions and recently added an e-commerce company.

They like UAE where they hold a hospital company and bank, Hungary where there is a healthcare company and Peru which has a financial services company. In terms of sectors they like consumer discretionary especially auto components, technology across hardware, software and semi-conductors and financials especially those focusing on mortgages and credit cards.

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Overall, they feel that emerging markets have a positive story. They feel there is stable macro picture across many economies, commodity prices are improving, economic growth favours EM, currency is recovering, valuations are supportive, the trade wars is calming down and investors are underweight. There are challenges particularly if the trade war escalates, withdrawal of dollar liquidity, China slowdown and election uncertainty.

In summary, although in the short term the performance has slightly slowed, the long term performance remains strong. They have a strong team and have a good reputation. The size of the fund might be a concern for some investors, and it may be worth comparing to other funds in the market.
