UPDATE....

Henry Lowson ran the successful AXA Framlington UK Smaller Companies Fund before joining Royal London, and becoming the lead manager on the Mid-Cap Fund in 2017. He is supported by Craig Yeaman who previously managed the Saracen UK Alpha Fund. During a difficult period of managing the fund he has managed to outperform the index. However, we would add that this is early days.

The fund looks to hold 80% in FTSE 250 companies (excluding Investment Trusts) and can hold around 20% in smaller companies and FTSE 100 companies. The fund looks to hold 45 to 60 holdings with a 3 to 5-year time horizon.

He looks to actively avoid airlines, contractors, biotechnology, advertising technology, loss making stocks and anything they don't understand. In terms of what they are looking for are those companies with strong economic tailwinds. Some of the thematic views and secular drivers for the fund include platforms, special situations, digital / mobile / data, outsourcing, low cost operators and self-help management change.

This is a high conviction portfolio although for this to play out we would expect a lower number of holdings. His focus is on around 200 companies. It then comes down to focusing on those companies which can grow profits and cash faster. Sustainability of earnings is an important factor in looking for good companies.

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He looks to avoid those companies where hope is factored in. He describes the strategy as investing within a risky asset class, in a low risk way. It means that if the market is momentum driven and racing ahead, this fund will struggle to keep pace. But these tend to be short sharp bursts and over the long term the fund will outperform.

Some examples of holdings include B&M who are a discount retailer mainly in the UK, growing around 50 stores a year. They have tried to expand into Germany. This hasn't worked, and they have recently tried to enter the French market. Telecomplus Plc have managed to gain market share where others have struggled and Clinigen has high barriers of entry and multiple levers for growth.

In terms of Brexit a soft Brexit should have little impact, but a Hard Brexit would likely hit domestic cyclicals, and global stocks should do better. For the fund they are not looking to change what they are doing so the focus remains on stock selection, fasting growing companies, structural growth, innovation and self-help and international exposure.

In summary, we had previously met Henry at AXA and he managed the fund well. It is early days at Royal London, and we would certainly want to see a longer track record. Others might be comfortable with the previous track record and invest on that.
